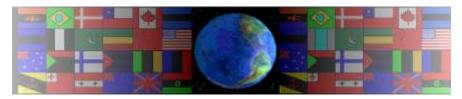

People can suffer from a wide and varied range of disabilities. A person may have a physical disability or a mental disability or an emotional disability or sensory disability.

A disability normally restricts or limits the activities of a person in some way. Although this may not always be the case.

1. Draw a line from the 'disability' to the correct description (these are very general descriptions). The first has been completed for you.

MENTAL DISABILITY PHYSICAL A person who may get upset easily, or is happy one moment and sad the next. A person who has difficulty relating / communicating how he/she feels to other people.

DISABILITY

A person who has problems with their sight or hearing. They need extra help, such as an hearing aid or even a guide dog.

EMOTIONAL DISABILITY

A person who has difficulty in physically moving or their movement is restricted in some way. For example, a person who needs a wheel chair.

SENSORY DISABILITY A person who suffers from a psychiatric problem. This may be a person who suffers from mental health issues.
